1. Plan Purpose

The purpose of the plan is to define procedures for protecting College property, reporting crimes, and helping provide a safe, secure environment for employees, students, and visitors.

2. Definitions

Third Parties - Individuals who are not College employees, such as relatives, acquaintances, or visitors.

Property - Any property owned, leased, or controlled by the College.

Employee/Campus Personnel - A Director, Counselor, Campus Manager, Campus Security Team, Vice President, or President.

Clery Act- The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act is the landmark federal law, originally known as the Campus Security Act, which requires colleges and universities across the United States to keep and disclose information about crime on and near their respective campuses.

Clery Geography - Any location on which the College is required to report crime statistics for purposes of the Clery Act, including:

Campus Property - Any building or property owned or controlled by the College within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used

by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes. Any building or property that is reasonably contiguous to the campus that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, if frequently used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or other retail vendor).

Public Property Within or Immediately Adjacent to the Campus – All public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities, that is within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus.

Non-campus Building or Property - Any building or property owned or controlled by the College that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, if frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

Crime Log - Criminal incidents and alleged criminal incidents that are reported to the MTECH Emergency Alert Line are logged internally and then forwarded to the local Police Department.

Preponderance of Evidence Standard (Title IX, Education Amendments of 1972) - Standard used to determine whether the allegation(s) more likely than not occurred.

Annual Security Report (ASR) - The annual report of crime statistics and other campus information that must be prepared and disseminated in accordance with the Clery Act.

Sexual Assault - As defined in the Clery Act, an offense that meets the definition of rape, fondling, incest, or statutory rape as used in the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting System. Any incident meeting this definition is considered a crime for purposes of Clery Act reporting, though criminal prosecution of crimes must meet the definition of Utah law (Utah Code Ann. § 76-9-702.1).

Under Utah law, a person is guilty of sexual battery if the person, under circumstances not amounting to rape, sodomy, forcible sex abuse, or aggravated sexual abuse, intentionally touches—whether or not through the clothing—the anus, buttocks, or any part of the genitals of another person, or the breast of a female person, and the person's conduct is under circumstances the person knows or should know will likely cause affront or alarm to the person touched.

Relationship/Dating Violence - As defined in the Clery Act, violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. The existence of such a relationship is determined based on the reporting party's statement and with consideration of the length of the relationship, type of relationship, and frequency of interaction between the parties. It includes, but is not limited to, sexual or physical abuse or the threat of such abuse. It does not include acts covered under the definition of domestic violence. Any incident meeting this definition is considered a crime for purposes of Clery Act reporting, though criminal prosecution of crimes must meet the definition of Utah law.

Under Utah law, any criminal offense involving violence or physical harm, or threat of violence or physical harm, when committed by a person against a dating partner of the person; or any attempt, conspiracy, or solicitation by a person to commit a criminal offense involving violence or physical harm against a dating partner of the person. "Dating partner" means a person who: (A) is an emancipated person under Section 15-2-1 or Title 78A, Chapter 6, Part 8, Emancipation; or (B) is 18 years of age or older; and is, or has been, in a dating relationship with the other party. "Dating partner" does not include an intimate partner, as defined in federal law in Title 18 U.S.C. Section 921. "Dating relationship" means a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature or a relationship which has romance or intimacy as a goal by one or both parties, regardless of whether the relationship involves sexual intimacy. "Dating relationship" does not mean casual fraternization in a business, educational, or social context. In determining, based on a totality of the circumstances, whether a dating relationship exists, all relevant factors shall be considered, including: (a) whether the parties developed interpersonal bonding above a mere casual fraternization; (b) the length of the parties' relationship; (c) the nature and the frequency of the parties' interactions, including communications indicating that the parties intended to begin a dating relationship; (d) the ongoing expectations of the parties, individual or jointly, with respect to the relationship; (e) whether, by statement or conduct, the parties demonstrated an affirmation of their relationship to others; and (f) whether other reasons exist that support or detract from a finding that a dating relationship exists; and it is not necessary that all, or a particular number, of the factors described herein are found to support the existence of a dating relationship (Utah Co Ann. § 78B-7-402).

Domestic Violence – As defined in the Clery Act, felony or misdemeanor crimes of violence committed (a) by a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim; (b) by a person with whom the victim shares a child in common; (c) by a person who is cohabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner; (d) by a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under

the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred; or (e) by any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred. Any incident meeting this definition is considered a crime for **PONS** purposes of Clery Act reporting, though criminal prosecution of crimes must meet the definition of Utah law.

Under Utah law, a criminal offense involving violence or physical harm or threat of violence or physical harm, or any attempt, conspiracy, or solicitation to commit a criminal offense involving violence or physical harm, when committed by one cohabitant against another. "Domestic violence" also means commission or attempt to commit, any of the following offenses by one cohabitant against another: aggravated assault, assault, criminal homicide, harassment, electronic communication harassment, kidnapping, child kidnapping, or aggravated kidnapping, mayhem, sexual offenses, stalking, unlawful detention, violation of protective order, any offense against property, possession of a deadly weapon with intent to assault, discharge of a firearm (Utah Code Ann. § 77-36-1(4)).

Stalking - As defined in the Clery Act, means engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for the person's safety or the safety of others; or suffer substantial emotional distress. For the purposes of this definition, course of conduct means two or more acts, including, but not limited to, acts which the stalker directly, indirectly, or through third parties, by any action, method, device, or means follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about, a person, or interferes with a person's property. "Substantial emotional distress" means significant mental suffering or anguish that may, but does not necessarily, require medical or other professional treatment or counseling. "Reasonable persons" means a reasonable person under similar circumstances and with similar identities to the victim. Any incident meeting this definition is considered a crime for purposes of Clery Act reporting, though criminal prosecution of crimes must meet the definition of Utah law.

Under Utah law, a person is guilty of stalking who intentionally or knowingly engages in a course of conduct directed at a specific person and knows or should know that the course of conduct would cause a reasonable person to fear for the person's own safety or the safety of a third person, or to suffer other emotional distress. A person is guilty of stalking who intentionally or knowingly violates a stalking injunction issued pursuant to Utah Code Ann. § 77-3a or a permanent criminal stalking injunction issued pursuant to Utah Code Ann. § 76-5-106.

Consent - Affirmative and freely given permission to engage in sexual activity. Consent, or lack of consent, can be expressed through words or conduct. A victim has not consented when incapacitated due to alcohol or other drugs. Under Utah law, consent is not given where the perpetrator overcomes the victim by application of force, violence, concealment, and/or surprise. A victim has not consented where the perpetrator intentionally impairs the victim by administering any substance without the victim's knowledge. A victim has not consented when he or she is unconscious, unaware that the act is occurring, or is physically unable to resist. Individuals under the age of 14 cannot consent to sexual activity.

Mass Notification System – A tool used to send text messages, emails, and phone messages to transmit brief, urgent messages to a large segment of the College population as quickly as possible.

4. Plan Statement

At Mountainland Technical College, the safety and security of our campus community is our utmost priority. We are dedicated to providing a safe and welcoming learning environment where students can thrive and achieve their educational goals. Our comprehensive safety plan encompasses proactive measures, emergency preparedness, and ongoing training to minimize risks and respond effectively to any potential threats or emergencies. We continuously collaborate with local authorities and stakeholders to ensure the highest standards of safety, and we remain committed to fostering a culture of vigilance, care, and preparedness throughout our institution.

5. Plan Objectives

- 5.1 Reduce Campus Crime Rates.
- 5.2 Emergency Response Preparedness: Ensure that 100% of campus staff and students participate in annual emergency response drills, such as fire, evacuation, and lockdown procedures.
- 5.3 Enhanced Surveillance: Expand and upgrade campus surveillance systems to provide comprehensive coverage and deter criminal activity.
- 5.4 Education: Develop and implement safety awareness training to educate students and staff on personal safety and emergency procedures.
- 5.5 Student and Staff Support Services: Provide counseling and support services for victims of crime or emergencies, ensuring they have access to the necessary resources for recovery.
- 5.6 Collaboration with Local Authorities: Foster strong partnerships with local law enforcement and emergency services to facilitate rapid response and coordination during crises.
- 5.7 Regular Safety Audits: Conduct annual safety audits of campus facilities and operations to identify potential risks and implement necessary improvements.
- 5.8 Timely Communication: Establish a robust communication system to quickly alert the campus community about emergencies and safety-related updates.
- 5.9 Incident Reporting Mechanisms: Implement and promote anonymous reporting mechanisms for students and staff to report safety concerns or suspicious activities.

6. Scope of Services

Mountainland Technical College encompasses a wide range of responsibilities, and activities aimed at ensuring the safety and well-being of students, faculty, staff and visitors. Key components of this include the following:

- 6.1 Behavioral Intervention Team - Promote campus safety and support for the well-being of students, staff, and the entire campus community including concerns related to mental health, disruptive behavior, threats, or potential violence. Assess and evaluate situations on a case by case basis.
- 6.2 MTECH Medical First Responder Program - Respond and assist students, faculty, and staff with minor medical incidents on campus not requiring Local Emergency response. When applicable, perform life saving procedures on major medical incidents while awaiting local emergency response.
- 6.3 Emergency Committee - Create and maintain Emergency Operations Plans for various emergency scenarios. Crisis management response during major incidents. Initiate and control Incident Command during such incidents.
- 6.4 Title IX - Enforcement of prohibited discrimination and harassment "on the basis of sex". Implement supportive measures for individuals reporting incidents. Coordinate investigations and hearing procedures for jurisdictional incidents.
- 6.5 Security Department - Develop, implement, and enforce safety policies and procedures including regular safety inspection and audits. Immediate response to safety and security issues including incident reporting and investigations. Provide safety training and educational programs for students, faculty, and staff. Ensure the availability and proper maintenance of life safety equipment
- 6.6 Risk Management - Ensure safety regulations, codes, and standards are updated and enforced to meet Utah State Risk Management requirements.

7. Major Activities

Major activities covering the scope of services provided by Mountainland Technical College include the following:

- 7.1 Monthly Behavioral Intervention Team Meetings including the Discussion of Current Situations
- 7.2 Ongoing First Responder Training and Review of Recent Responses

- 7.3 Quarterly Emergency Committee Meetings Including Committee Discussion, Trainings, Table Top Drills, and Live Drills
- 7.4 Ongoing Training For Proper Response to Title IX Cases and continued compliance to federal Title IX regulations.
- 7.5 Continuous Training to Meet DOPL Licensure Standards
- 7.6 Ensuring compliance with current Risk Management regulations by maintaining communication and attending State Risk Management Symposiums and training.

8. Budgetary Resources

Funding and budgetary resources for the MTECH Campus Safety, Response, and Reporting Plan come from the Institutional General Fund.

9. Evaluations of the Plan

The MTECH Campus Safety, Response, and Reporting Plan is reviewed annually by Subject Matter Experts and revised as necessary. After review, the plan is approved by the Executive Staff.

10. Stakeholders

The Campus Safety, Response, and Reporting Plan is shared with all MTECH employees and is available to students, Trustees, and other Consititutents through BoardDocs at <https://go.boarddocs.com/ut/mtc/Board.nsf/Public>.

11. Policy

It is the policy of the College to take reasonable precautions to provide a safe and secure environment for people, facilities, equipment, and property and comply with federal laws regarding campus safety.

12. General

- 12.1 Any violent or potentially violent behavior, physical assault, threatening behavior, harassment, or verbal abuse that arises from or occurs on College property by students, employees, or third parties will not be tolerated and may be grounds for immediate dismissal, eviction from campus premises, arrest, etc.

- 12.2 The College specifically prohibits the possession of weapons in violation of law while on College property.
- 12.3 Employees are encouraged to participate in training provided by the College or other resources so that they will be able to appropriately respond to situations that could be considered unsafe or harmful to others.
- 12.4 The College shall make timely reports to the campus community regarding crimes considered to be a threat to employees and students that are reported to the MTECH Emergency Alert Line (801) 753-4199 (which will forward to the Campus Security Team) or local police agencies.
- 12.5 The Campus has specific guidelines for handling matters related to College safety and security. The guidelines are outlined more fully in the *Student Health & Safety Plan* and the *Emergency Operations Plan*.

13. Campus Security

- 13.1 Relationship of Campus Personnel and Other Law Enforcement Agencies: Campus Personnel work closely with local law enforcement agencies as well as state, county and federal authorities. Off-campus offices and remote campus sites receive police services from the local jurisdictions in which the sites are located.
- 13.2 Referral for Disciplinary Action: Incidents involving student misconduct may be referred to the Counseling Division for disciplinary action. Incidents involving staff and faculty misconduct may be referred to The Human Resources Department for possible disciplinary action.
- 13.3 Reporting: The College encourages accurate and prompt reporting of all crimes to the local Police Department. A crime log shall be kept by the College Administration and Police Department for crimes reported to them in accordance with the Clery Act.

14. Reporting Criminal Activity or Incidents

- 14.1 Employees, students, and others who become aware of criminal actions or other emergencies anywhere within the Clery geography should report them to the MTECH Emergency Alert Line at (801) 753-4199, or dial 911 for the local Police Department.

- 14.2 Acts of violence, including sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, and other violent, threatening or destructive acts, can interfere with the rights of students, employees and guests of the College. When an employee receives information that such acts may have occurred, they shall respond quickly and effectively, reporting the matter to Campus Security, who will properly investigate it, and take precautions to prevent further harm. Such conduct may violate one or more College policies, including *Campus Safety, Response, and Reporting Plan, Student Health & Safety Plan, Healthcare and Safety of Employees, Students & Guests Plan, and Student Support Policies (600.613)*. These policies set standards for students and employees.
- 14.3 Student complaints will be processed through the Counseling office. This is in accordance with the Employee Grievance Policy (300.325) and the Student Grievance Policy (600.608). All conduct and grievance processes are conducted in a manner that is consistent with state and federal laws and provide required due process to all parties involved. All matters will also be reviewed by the Campus Security Team.
- 14.4 All proceedings provide a prompt, fair and impartial process from the initial investigation to the final disposition.
- 14.5 Where proceedings deal with dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking, hearing officials receive annual training on those issues and how to properly conduct an investigation and hearing process that protects the safety of victims and promotes accountability.
- 14.6 The accuser and accused have the same opportunities to have others present during any disciplinary proceeding, including the opportunity to be accompanied to any related meeting by an advisor of his or her own choice in accordance with College policy.
- 14.7 In all processes, matters are reviewed based upon a preponderance of the evidence standard.
- 14.8 Notification of the result of any disciplinary proceedings that arise from an allegation of dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault or stalking, are given in writing simultaneously to both the accuser and the accused.
- 14.9 Employees and students who believe they are victims of a crime may report incidents in confidence. Said records shall only be disclosed as required by law.

- 14.10 Individuals who witness or are the victim of crime but wish to remain anonymous may report the crime to Campus Personnel or local Police Department and specifically request that they remain anonymous.
- 14.11 Persons should be aware that filing an anonymous report may limit the ability of security and police to provide further assistance or to investigate the crime.
- 14.12 Incidents reported to campus personnel shall be investigated for the purpose of reducing crime, improving safety, facilitating disciplinary referrals, and aiding in criminal prosecution if necessary.
- 14.13 If a victim chooses not to make a complaint regarding an incident, he or she should consider speaking with campus personnel or other law enforcement to preserve evidence in the event that the victim changes his or her mind at a later date.
- 14.14 If a drug, alcohol, or weapons violation is reported to an employee/campus personnel, documented for the record, and could result in the imposition of a sanction, the information must be reported to The Human Resources Division so it can be included in the Annual Security Report (ASR).
- 14.15 Individuals who intentionally and knowingly make false accusations of criminal activity or provide false information to College officials in connection with an accusation and/or investigation of criminal activity, are subject to discipline under College policy as well as criminal and/or civil penalties under applicable law.
- 14.16 Any possible criminal investigation will be reported to Local Law Enforcement.

15. Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics

- 15.1 All crimes subject to the Clery Act and Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 shall be accurately reported and published on an annual basis in the ASR. Statistics are collected and reported annually to the Department of Education and published on the College's website in compliance with the Clery Act.
- 15.2 The Campus ASR is posted on the College's website <https://mtec.edu/safety/>. This annual report provides information regarding the frequency of crimes

committed on MTECH campuses and policies and procedures designed to combat crime and strengthen security for the four most recent calendar years.

16. Emergency Operations Plan (EOP), Timely Warnings, and Response

- 16.1 The EOP outlines strategies for coping with hazards that threaten the campus and defines the role and responsibilities of departments, divisions, and agencies on- and off-campus that are vital in helping protect life and property. The EOP is posted on the College's website and a physical copy can be accessed in each office or classroom throughout the campuses.
- 16.2 In the event of a significant emergency or dangerous situation on campus involving the immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees, the following steps shall be taken:
 - 16.2.1 First responders shall follow the response protocols as outlined in their agencies' policies.
 - 16.2.2 A member of the Campus Security Team, in consultation with first responders as needed, shall determine the appropriate segment or segments of the campus community to receive a notification and determine the content of the notification.
 - 16.2.3 The designated member shall then initiate without delay and taking into account the safety of the community, the campus alert system message unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of authorities, compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.
- 16.3 Anyone with information warranting a timely warning should report the circumstances to an employee/campus personnel.
- 16.4 The College shall provide timely warnings to the campus community:
 - 16.4.1 when certain crimes are reported to campus personnel (as defined by federal law) and are determined to represent an imminent or ongoing threat to students on campus or any other Clery geography; and/or
 - 16.4.2 to warn the campus population of events such as campus closure, lock-down, armed assailant, building evacuation, campus

evacuation, and lost child on campus or any other Clery geography. The system also provides directions for the types of action to take.

- 16.5 The College may issue these warnings via postings around campus, through its mass notification system, campus email system, local news media, or in any other way the College deems necessary.
- 16.6 The College may disseminate emergency information to the larger community in a variety of ways. Information may be shared with local emergency services dispatch, it may be posted on the College website or social media feeds, and the information may be disseminated to various news media outlets by the College's Public Information Officer.
- 16.7 Follow-up messages/notifications shall be disseminated in the same manner that the original alert was administered. Follow-ups shall take place throughout the emergency whenever possible and upon termination of the emergency.
- 16.8 The College shall test its emergency response and evacuation procedures on at least an annual basis. The results of the exercise shall be documented in the ASR.

17. On-campus Vehicle Accidents

Accidents should be reported to the Security Department and local police departments having jurisdiction. If the accident only involves minor damage, police may decline response and instruct vehicle operators to exchange information and report to the Security Department.

18. Drug/Alcohol Enforcement

- 18.1 Use, possession, distribution, manufacturing, or being under the influence of alcohol and/or controlled substances while on College property or at College- sponsored activities is prohibited.
- 18.2 Students: Under the Student Code of Conduct, students are subject to discipline for use, possession, or distribution of alcoholic beverages, narcotics, or other controlled substances of any type on campus.
- 18.3 Employees: In compliance with the requirements of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 (P.L. 100-690), the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance (as

defined in Schedules I through V of section 202 of the Controlled Substances Act (21 U.S.C. § 812)) is prohibited in Mountainland Technical College's workplace.

- 18.4 Any suspicion of drug or alcohol use shall be reported to the Campus Security team and may be referred to Law Enforcement.

19. Education and Prevention Programs

- 19.1 The College shall use various platforms and courses to provide comprehensive educational programming to help prevent domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.
- 19.2 Educational programming shall consist of primary prevention and awareness programs for all incoming students and new employees as well as ongoing awareness and prevention campaigns for students, faculty, and staff.
- 19.3 The prevention and awareness programs shall:
- 19.3.1 Identify domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking as prohibited conduct;
 - 19.3.2 Define behavior that constitutes domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking according to federal and state law;
 - 19.3.3 Define behavior and actions that constitute consent to sexual activity in the state of Utah as defined in Utah Code 76-5-406;
 - 19.3.4 Provide safe and positive options for bystander intervention that may be carried out by an individual to prevent harm or intervene when there is a risk of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking against a person other than the bystander. Also provides information on risk reduction so that students and employees may recognize warning signs of abusive behavior and how to avoid potential attacks; and
 - 19.3.5 Provide an overview of the information contained in the College's ASR in compliance with the Clery Act.

20. Available Help

- 20.1 The Crisis Chat and Tip Line SafeUT is a statewide service that provides real-time crisis intervention to youth through live chat and a confidential tip program – right from their smartphone. Licensed clinicians in the 24/7

CrisisLine call center respond to all incoming chats, and calls by providing counseling on topics including:

- 20.1.1 Depression, anxiety, or other mental health issues;
- 20.1.2 Suicide prevention;
- 20.1.3 Loss and grief;
- 20.1.4 Bullying and cyberbullying;
- 20.1.5 Drug and alcohol problems;
- 20.1.6 Self-harm;
- 20.1.7 Relationship difficulties;
- 20.1.8 Any life challenges

21.2 Information on the sex offender registry can also be found on the Utah Department of Corrections website, <http://www.corrections.utah.gov>.

21.3 In Utah, convicted sex offenders must register with the jurisdiction in which they reside. Offenders are required to submit to the registry if they are working at or attending school at the College.
